### ROYAL COMMISSION

To the Honourable Sir Hal Pateshall Colebatch, K.B., C.M.G., M.L.C.; the Honourable Cyril Richard Cornish, D.S.O., M.L.C.; the Honourable Edmund Henry Hartley Hall, M.L.C.; the Honourable Charles Bennett Williams, M.L.C., and the Honourable Garnet Barrington Wood, M.L.C.

I, THE said Lieutenant-Governor, acting with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby appoint you the said Sir Hal Pateshall Colebatch, Cyril Richard Cornish, Edmund Henry Hartley Hall, Charles Bennett Williams, and Garnet Barrington Wood to be an honorary Royal Commission, without payment of remuneration, to do the following things, namely:—

1. To inquire into and report upon—
  - (a) what provision should be made by the State for the care and reform of youthful delinquents;
  - (b) the conditions of Barton's Mill prison as a place of detention for male youthful delinquents and of York or elsewhere for females, and whether improvements can be effected at such places for such purposes; and
  - (c) the problem of juvenile delinquency generally:

AND I hereby appoint you the said Sir Hal Pateshall Colebatch to be Chairman of the said Royal Commission:

AND I declare that you shall, by virtue of this Commission, be a Royal Commission within the Royal Commissioners' Powers Act, 1902, as reprinted in the Appendix to the Sessional Volume of the Statutes for the year 1928, and that you shall have the powers of a Royal Commission or the chairman thereof under the said Act:

AND I hereby request you, as soon as reasonably may be, to report to me in writing the result of this your Commission.

WHEREAS by the Fire Brigades Act, 1942, it is provided that the said Act shall come into operation on a date to be fixed by Proclamation and by a Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* on the 9th day of April, 1943, the said Act was proclaimed erroneously and ineffectively to come into operation on the 5th day of April, 1943: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, do hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, cancel and revoke the Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* on the 9th day of April, 1943, as aforesaid and in lieu thereof proclaim that the Fire Brigades Act, 1942, shall come into operation on the 17th day of May, 1943.

WHEREAS by section 9 of the Fisheries Act, 1905-40, it is provided that the Governor may by Proclamation prohibit all persons from taking any fish whatsoever, in every or any specified portion of Western Australian waters, by means of fishing nets and fishing lines, or either of such means of capture, or by any other specified means of capture, for any specified term: Now, therefore I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, in exercise of the powers aforesaid and of every other power enabling me in this behalf proclaim and declare as follows:—That all those portions of Western Australian waters defined in the Schedule hereto shall be closed against the use of fishing nets as from the 15th day of May, 1943, until the 15th day of October, 1945:—

## Schedule.

(1) Welstead Estuary:—The whole of the rivers, tributaries, creeks and other streams flowing into the waters of the Welstead Estuary, more especially the S.W. Bay River and Lizzie Creek.

(2) Beaufort Estuary:—The whole of the rivers, tributaries, and other streams flowing into the waters of the Beaufort Estuary, more especially the Pallinup and Salt Rivers.

NATIONAL SECURITY (GENERAL)  
REGULATIONS.

State of Western Australia.

*Licensed Premises (Suspension of License) Order.*

WHEREAS by regulation 35A of the Commonwealth National Security (General) Regulations (as amended by Statutory Rule, 1941, No. 287) it is provided, *inter alia*, that the Premier of any State, after consultation with the Minister of State for Home Security, or an officer of the Department of Home Security authorised by that Minister to act on his behalf, and with the Commandant of a Military District, or an officer authorised by the Minister of State for Defence, or the Minister of State for the Army to act on behalf of such

Commandant, may by Order make such provision as he deems necessary to protect the persons and property of the civil population in that State, or any part thereof, in case of emergency: And whereas I, John Collings Willcock, M.L.A., Premier of the State of Western Australia, acting in pursuance of the power conferred as aforesaid, made and issued an Order dated the 19th day of March, 1942, which was cited as "the Licensed Premises (Suspension of License) Order," and was published in the *Government Gazette* of Western Australia on the 26th day of March, 1942, and which is still in force (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order"): And whereas it is now deemed desirable and expedient to amend the principal Order in the manner hereinafter mentioned: Now, therefore I, the said John Collings Willcock, M.L.A., acting as such Premier aforesaid, after having duly held consultations, as hereinbefore mentioned, and acting pursuant to the power conferred by the said regulation 35A, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Licensed Premises (Suspension of License) Order No. 2.

2. This Order shall be read as one with the principal Order.

3. The principal Order is amended—

(a) by inserting in clause 3 thereof after the word "action" at the end of paragraph (g) the word "or."

(b) by inserting in clause 3 thereof, immediately below paragraph (g), a new paragraph, as follows:—

(h) cannot be carried on except at a financial loss for the reason that the civil population or a substantial part of the civil population usually residing in the district or locality served by the licensed premises has ceased to reside in such district or locality in consequence of circumstances arising either directly or indirectly from the present war;

(c) by inserting in paragraph (i) of clause 3, after the words "occupied as aforesaid," in lines 18 and 19 of the said paragraph (i) (as published in the *Government Gazette* on the 26th day of March, 1942), the words "or in cases to which paragraph (h) of this clause applies."

4. This Order shall operate and have effect as from and including the date of the publication thereof in the *Government Gazette* of Western Australia.

FARMERS' DEBTS ADJUSTMENT ACT, 1930-1934.

NOTICE is hereby given that the following Stay Orders have been issued in accordance with section 7, subsection (1) of the Farmers' Debts Adjustment Act, 1930-1934, which reads as follows:—

A Stay Order shall direct that no action, execution, distress for rent, proceedings on default for breach of covenant under any mortgage or other security for money, or under an agreement for sale and purchase of lands, or other process or proceeding, shall be commenced or proceeded with, or put in force against the farmer or any of the farmer's assets, whether utilised in connection with or forming portion of the assets comprised in his farming business or not, during the operation of such Stay Order: Provided that, by leave of a Judge, any action may, notwithstanding the Stay Order, be instituted and/or carried on against the farmer but not beyond judgment.

2. Subject as in this by-law hereinafter provided, the subscription to be paid by a subscriber shall be assessed in accordance with the following rates:—

- (a) For a subscriber with dependants—two shillings per week or £1 4s. per quarter;
- (b) For a subscriber not having dependants—one shilling and sixpence per week or 18s. per quarter;
- (c) For a subscriber being under the age of twenty-one years, and not having dependants—one shilling per week or 12s. per quarter.

Provided that a subscriber whose income from all sources exceeds four hundred and fifty pounds per annum and in consequence thereof is subject to the proviso to by-law 5 of these by-laws shall not be liable to pay or be required to pay as membership subscription an aggregate amount which in any year of his membership would exceed the sum of three pounds three shillings, and where the subscription payable by a subscriber aforesaid, if assessed in accordance with the appropriate rate prescribed in this by-law would in a year of his membership exceed the said sum of three pounds three shillings, the subscriber shall in such year receive as a rebate in respect of his subscription for that year the difference between the aggregate amount of the subscription assessed as aforesaid and the said sum of three pounds three shillings.

(2) By-law 5 is deleted, and a new by-law is inserted in lieu thereof as follows:—

5. Subject as in this by-law hereinafter provided, every subscriber shall be entitled to medical and hospital treatment as an indoor or outdoor patient and to medicine, dressings, and appliances, subject to the conditions and limitations set forth elsewhere in these by-laws, for so long as the medical officer deems necessary, free of charge:

Provided that a subscriber whose income from all sources exceeds four hundred and fifty pounds per annum shall not be entitled to receive free of charge medical treatment under the provisions of these by-laws, but may receive medical treatment in the hospital under and in accordance with the terms of any private arrangement which he may make with the medical officer or with any other medical practitioner from whom he desires such medical treatment.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Pig Industry Compensation Regulations, 1943.
2. The form of application for compensation under any Act for pigs destroyed by or by the order of any meat inspector or other authorised person, or with the consent of the Chief Veterinary Surgeon or an approved person, and the certificate to accompany same shall be in the form of Schedule A.
3. The form of application for compensation under the Act for carcasses or portion of a carcass condemned by a meat inspector or other authorised person and the certificate to accompany same shall be in the form of Schedule B.
4. Applications for compensation shall be lodged with the Chief Veterinary Surgeon, Department of Agriculture, St. George's terrace, Perth.

5. The compensation payable in respect of the forequarters of a carcass which has been condemned as unfit for human consumption because of disease shall be one-third of the market value of the pig immediately prior to slaughter. The compensation payable in respect of the hindquarters of a carcass so condemned shall be one-half of the market value of the pig immediately prior to slaughter.

For the purposes of this regulation, the hindquarters shall be deemed to be the hams plus one-half of the middle, and the forequarters shall be deemed to be the shoulder plus one-half of the middle.

The Civil Defence Regulations, 1941 are amended as follows:—

(1) Regulation 24 is amended as follows:—

(a) by inserting after the word "Warden" in line 4 of subparagraph (j) of paragraph (4) the words "or any trial air raid exercise held under the authority of regulation 24A of these regulations."

(b) by inserting after the word "Warden" in line 4 of subparagraph (h) of paragraph (5) the words "or any trial air raid exercise held under the authority of regulation 24A of these regulations."

(2) A new regulation is inserted after regulation 24 as follows:—

24A. The Council may at any time, and from time to time, order a trial air raid exercise to be carried out in such district or districts, as may be specified in such order. Such exercise shall commence on the sounding of the "action warning" signal on the public air raid sirens, and cease on the sounding of the "raiders passed" signal on the said sirens. The production of any newspaper in which a notice has been published, or of a certificate signed by the Under Secretary for Civil Defence, whose signature shall be judicially recognised for the purpose of these regulations, shall be *prima facie* evidence of the order to hold a trial air raid exercise.

(3) Form No. 4 in the Appendix to the regulations is deleted and a new Form No. 4 is inserted in lieu thereof as follows:—
